Recycling

- Materials collected via the county's curbside and commercial/multi-family routes remain consistent with 2012 volumes, at 4,837 tons.
- Winona County's official recycling rate, according to the most recent SCORE Report, is 54.7%. This SCORE rate includes everything that is recycled within the county, including through private contracts and contractors, compared to the tons of material burned and buried in 2012.
- Satisfaction with 2012 program changes remains high, and resulting implementation challenges have been effectively worked through.
- With a documented 94% participation rate, unparalleled convenience and excellent recovery rates, Winona County's Recycling Program continues to win praise in St. Paul, and per MPCA staff, is described as the model against which other counties should measure their programs.

Household Hazardous Waste

- Facility usage numbers, including tons recycled, returned to 2011 rates, after the surprising 11% spike experienced in 2012.
- Tons of hazardous waste recycled in Winona County in 2013 was 43.4 tons, and the # of users was 2,770.

Twenty-three county businesses managed more than 3.5 tons of hazardous waste through the county.
