Resolution No. 2026 - 51

Resolution approving participation
in the state's performance measurement program for 2026

WHEREAS, the State Legislature created the Council on Local Results and Innovation which set a standard set of ten performance measures for cities that will aid residents, taxpayers and state and local elected officials in determining the efficiency of local services; and

WHEREAS, the city of New Hope has participated in the new standards measure program voluntarily since 2011 and wishes to do so again this year; and

WHEREAS, benefits to the City for participation in the Minnesota Council on Local Results and Innovation's comprehensive performance measurement program are outlined in MS 6.91 and include eligibility for reimbursement as set by state statute and exemption from levy limits for taxes, if levy limits are in effect; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has adopted and implemented at least 10 of the performance measures, as developed by the Council on Local Results and Innovation, and a system to use this information to help plan, budget, manage and evaluate programs and processes for optimal future outcomes; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the New Hope City Council will report the results of the performance measures to its citizenry by the end of the year through publication, direct mailing, posting on the city's website, or through a public hearing at which the budget and levy will be discussed and public input allowed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the city of New Hope will submit to the Office of the State Auditor the actual results of the performance measures adopted by the city.

Review 2025 performance measures survey results

Requested Action

Staff requests to discuss the results of the 2025 City Services Survey. For the past several years, excerpts from these survey results have been included in the budget public hearing presentation, and staff intends to do the same this year. Therefore, they would like to review them with the City Council before the public hearing.

Policy/Past Practice

In 2011, the Minnesota Legislature's Council on Local Results and Innovation established a standard set of ten performance measures for cities. These measures are designed to help residents, taxpayers, and state and local officials assess the effectiveness of city services and gauge residents' opinions about those services. The City of New Hope has participated in this program since its inception. Cities involved in the program are eligible for a reimbursement of \$0.14 per capita, which translates to approximately \$3,000 per year for New Hope. While the survey results may not be scientifically rigorous, they still provide valuable feedback. In 2022, the City conducted a comprehensive citywide survey through the Morris Leatherman Company, which likely offers a more accurate representation of residents' opinions on City services.

Background

During the May 19, 2025 work session, the City Council expressed its support for ongoing participation in the state's performance measures program. Council reviewed and approved the proposed survey questions.

To participate in the 2025 performance measures program, the City Council needed to adopt a resolution to implement the performance measures and submit a report of the previous year's results to the Office of the State Auditor by July 1, 2025. The City Council adopted the resolution approving the program at their meeting on May 27, 2025, and subsequently filed the required report with the state. The program mandates that cities implement ten standard performance measures to assess residents' satisfaction with local services.

The 2025 surveys were sent to residents along with their July utility bills and were also made available on the city's website and at City Hall from July 1, 2025, to October 1, 2025. Survey response rates since 2012 are as follows:

- 2012 – 189 residents
- 2013 – 1,114 residents
- 2014 – 1,062 residents
- 2015 – 400 residents (Morris Leatherman Professional Survey)
- 2016 – 646 residents (submission: 140 online, 506 paper)
- 2017 – 632 residents (submission: 98 online, 534 paper)
- 2018 – 679 residents (submission: 194 online, 485 paper)
- 2019 – 610 residents (submission: 246 online, 346 paper)
- 2020 – 839 residents (submission: 375 online, 464 paper)

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- 2021 – 663 residents (submission: 297 online, 366 paper)
- 2022 – 400 residents (Morris Leatherman Professional Survey)
- 2023 – 561 Residents (submission: 201 online, 360 paper)
- 2024 – 499 Residents (submission: 172 online, 327 paper)
- 2025 – 529 Residents (submission: 263 online, 266 paper)

Survey Results

The 2025 survey results are attached with comparison data from 2022, 2023 and 2024. In general, the responses were very similar to the last survey completed by the City in 2024.

- When asked how many years respondents have lived in New Hope, 58% have lived in the City more than 20 years, 13% between 11 and 20 years, and 29% have lived here less than 10 years.
- When asked how much longer into the future respondents expect to live in New Hope, 38% answered 11 or more years, 28% answered between 6-10 years, 25% answered between 2-5 years, and 9% did not know or indicated less than one year.
- The overall quality of city services rating of "excellent" or "good" decreased from 84% in 2024 to 78% in 2025.
- The city's payable taxable property market value decreased by 0.42% between 2024 and 2025.
- The overall appearance of the city rating of "excellent" or "good" increased from 81% in 2024 to 78% in 2025.
- 58% of respondents indicated they feel "excellent" or "good" about their opportunities to provide input and feedback about issues to the City of New Hope. This increased from 61% in 2024.
- Citizens' categorizing their overall feeling of safety in the city as "very safe" or "somewhat safe" increased slightly from 91% to 93% between 2024 and 2025.
- The overall quality of fire education, inspection, and response services receiving a rating of "excellent" or "good" decreased slightly from 81% to 79% between 2024 and 2025.
- The overall condition of county roads receiving a rating of "excellent" or "good" increased from 74% to 76% from 2024 to 2025 as well as for city roads which increased from 75% to 78% between 2024 and 2025.
- The average pavement condition rating for city streets decreased to 81 in 2025 after being 83 in 2024 (both are still rated at "excellent").
- The overall quality of snowplowing services receiving an "excellent" or "good" rating increased slightly from 83% to 84% between 2024 and 2025.
- The ratings of "excellent" or "good" for the quality of water supply decreased slightly from 83% in 2024 to 80% in 2025.
- 73% of citizens rated stormwater management's dependability and overall quality as "excellent" or "good," a decrease of 7% from 80% in 2024.
- Survey rating of city sanitary sewer service decreased from 87% in 2024 to 83% in 2025.
- The overall quality of recreational programs receiving an "excellent" or "good" rating stayed flat from last year at 59%, and facilities decreased from 81% in 2024 to 79% in 2025. It's important to note that when N/A are omitted from the program rating (e.g., someone who has not participated), the ranking increases to 71%.
- Citizens' rating of the toughness of code enforcement being "about right" increased from 60% to 62% between 2024 and 2025.
- The overall quality of communication/distribution of information receiving a rating of "excellent" or "good" decreased from 70% to 68% between 2024 and 2025.

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- Respondents' ranked their top source for City information as follows: City Publications, City Social Media, City Website, Sun Post/CCX Media and Word of Mouth.
- When asked if they knew about the Curbside Appeal Reimbursement Program and how they heard about it, 37% said the newsletter, 12% said the City website or Facebook page, 3% said the news media, 5% said other, and 40% said they did not know about the program.

A copy of the survey data is attached and will be incorporated into the 2025 Performance Measurement Report. Excerpts will also be included in the annual budget presentation. Early next year, staff will present the proposed 2026 survey questions for review/approval by the City Council and results from the 2025 Survey will be submitted to the state.

All comments from respondents have been compiled and organized by category in the attached memorandum. Some spelling errors have been corrected; however, the general content remains unchanged.

The final question on the survey allowed residents to request contact from City staff regarding their comments or concerns. A total of 53 residents asked to be contacted by the City. These callback requests were distributed among each department head for completion. Staff returned calls to all who requested a callback, either by speaking directly with each resident or if there was no answer, by leaving a message with their contact details. Residents who received follow-up phone calls provided overall positive feedback that the city took the time to contact them and to address their concerns or answer questions.

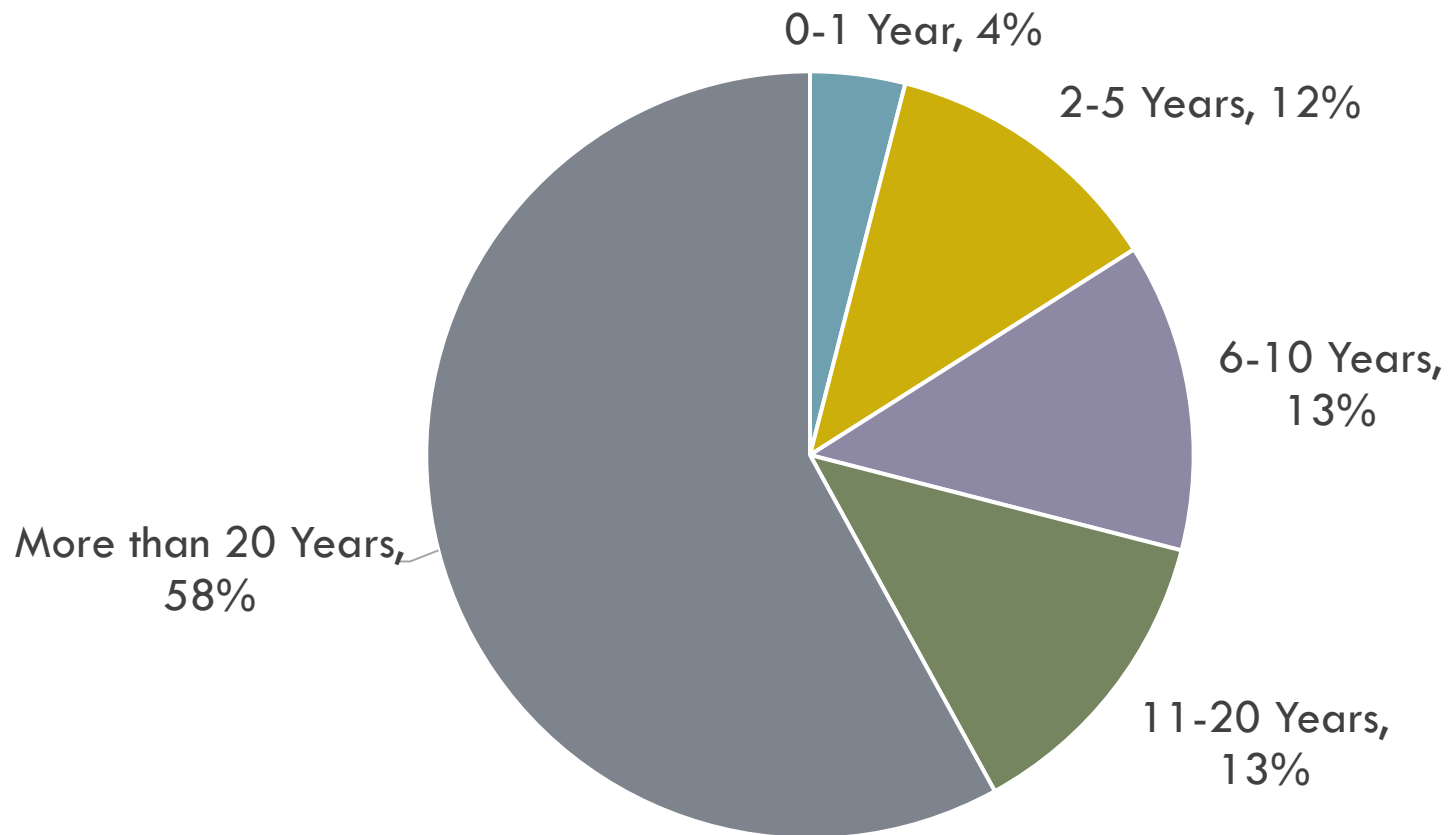

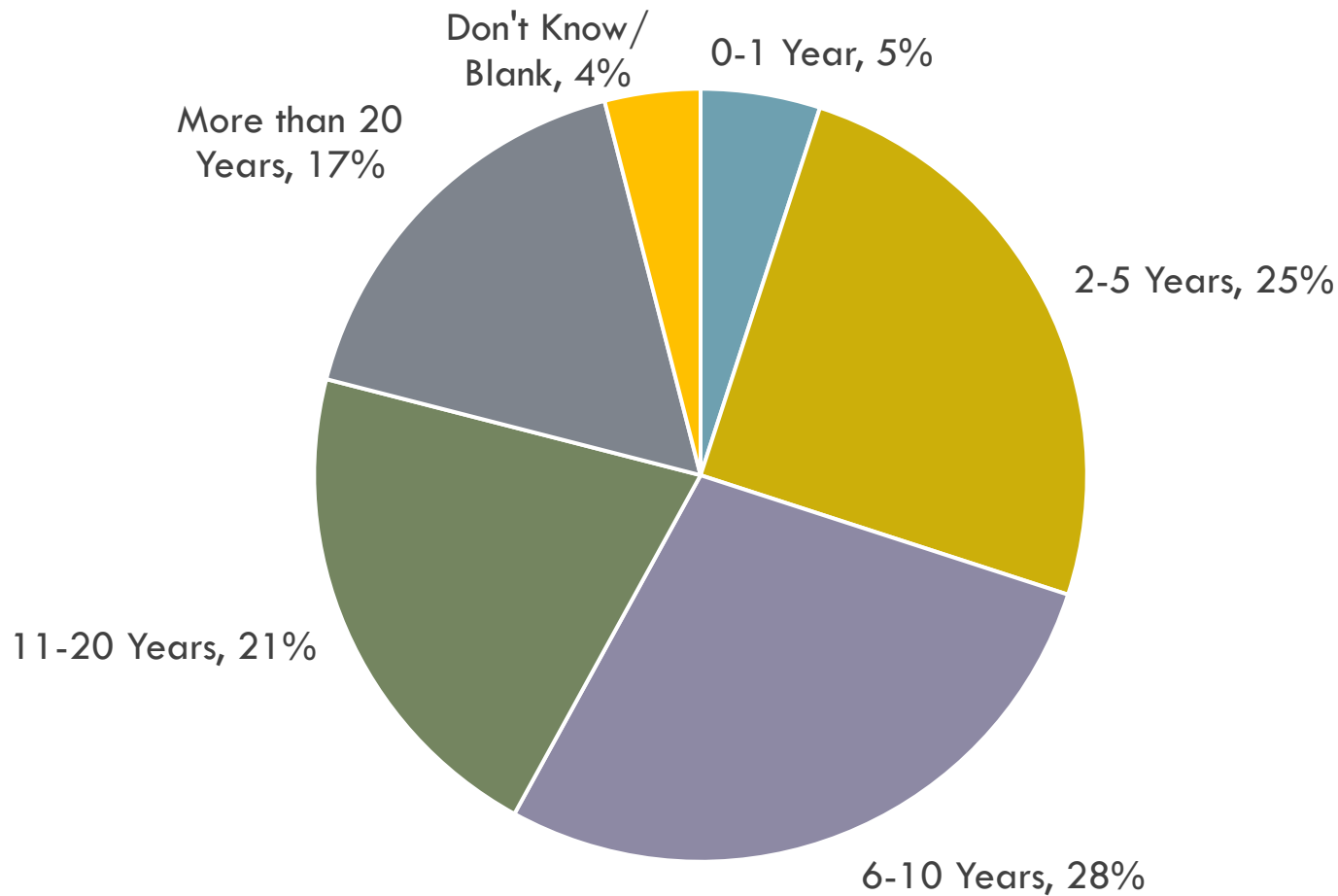

Q1: HOW MANY YEARS HAVE YOU LIVED IN NEW HOPE?



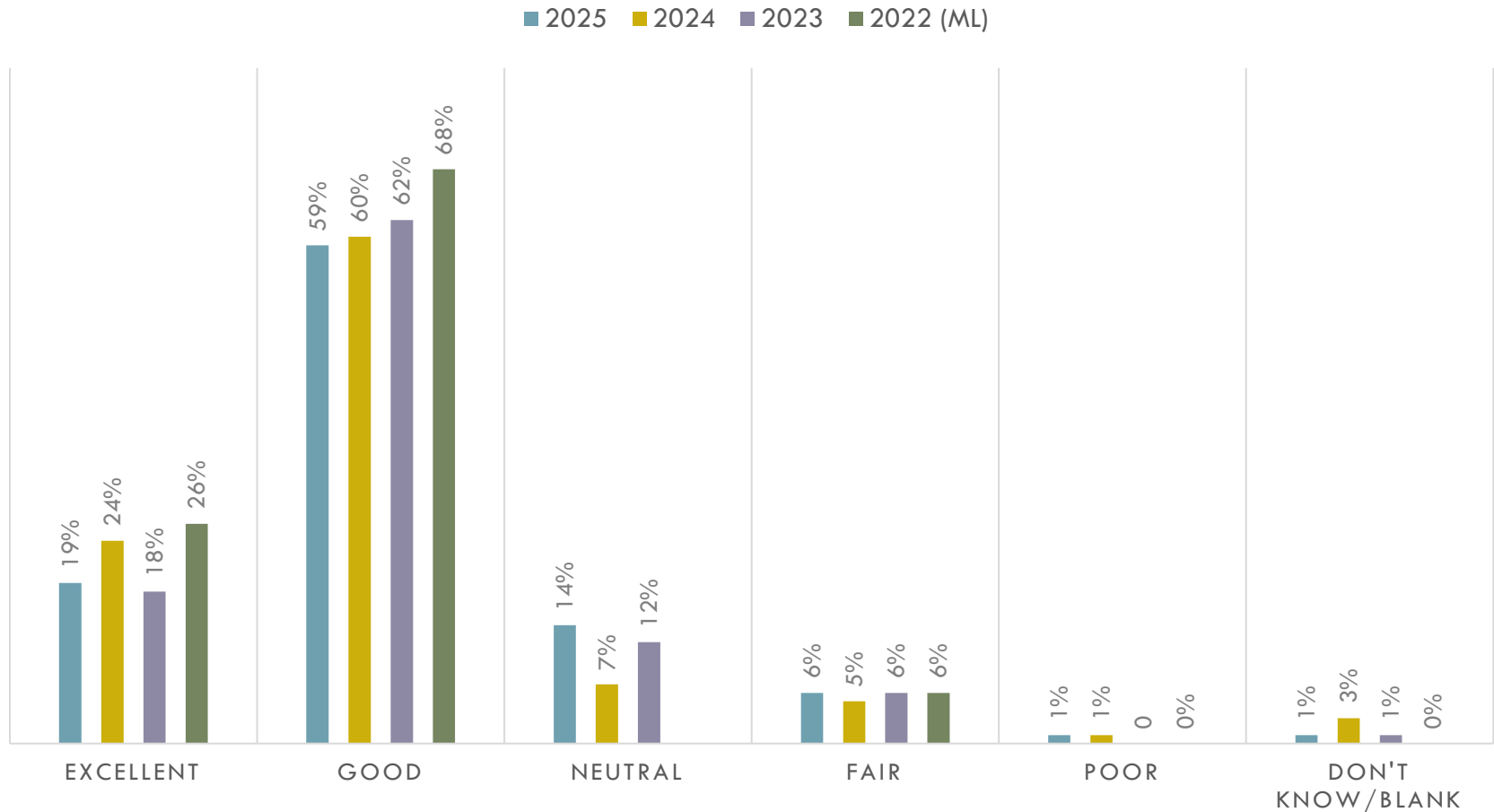
Q2: AS THINGS STAND NOW, HOW LONG IN THE FUTURE DO YOU EXPECT TO LIVE IN NEW HOPE?





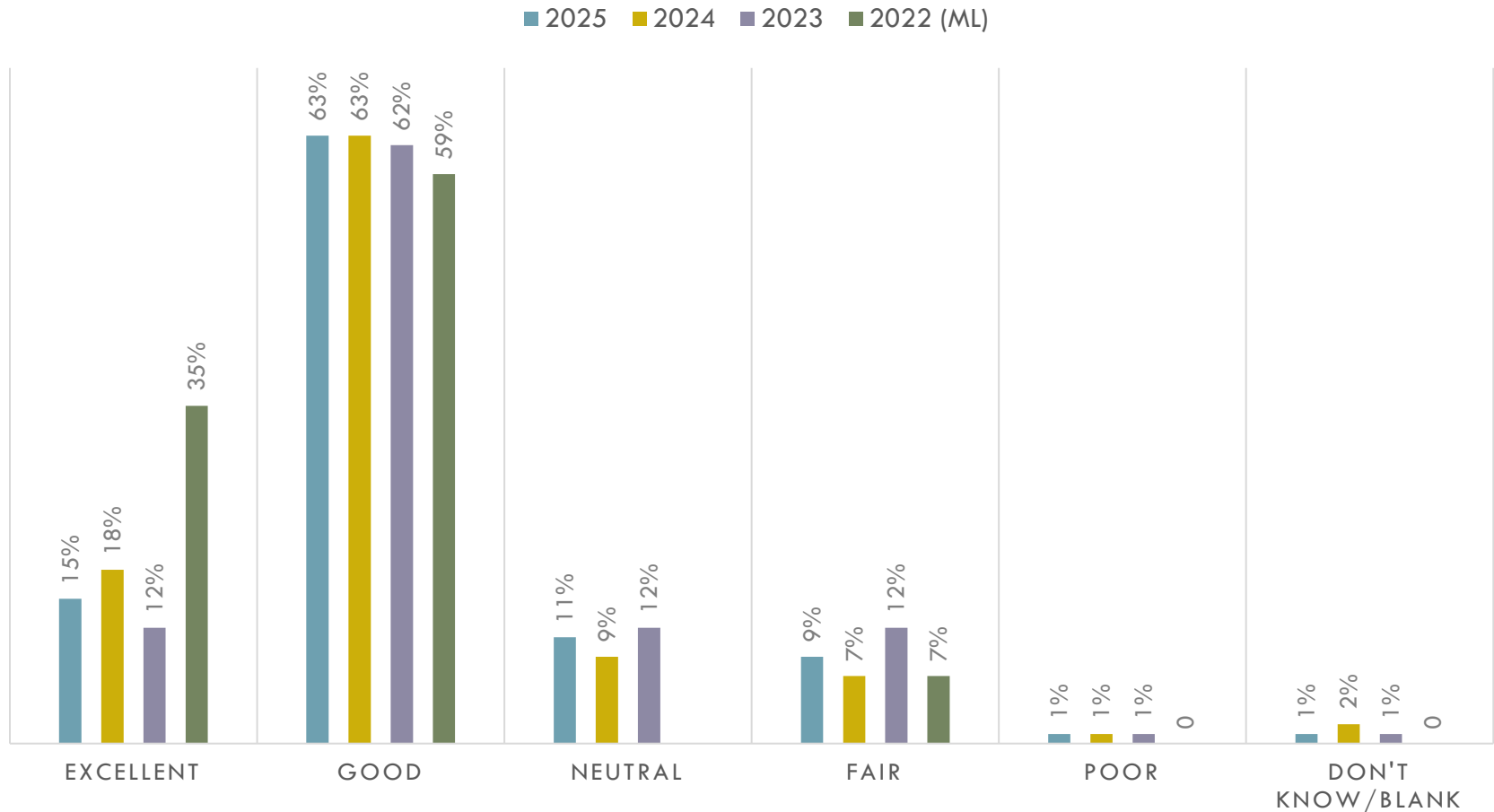

Q18: HOW WOULD YOU RATE THE OVERALL QUALITY OF SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE CITY?



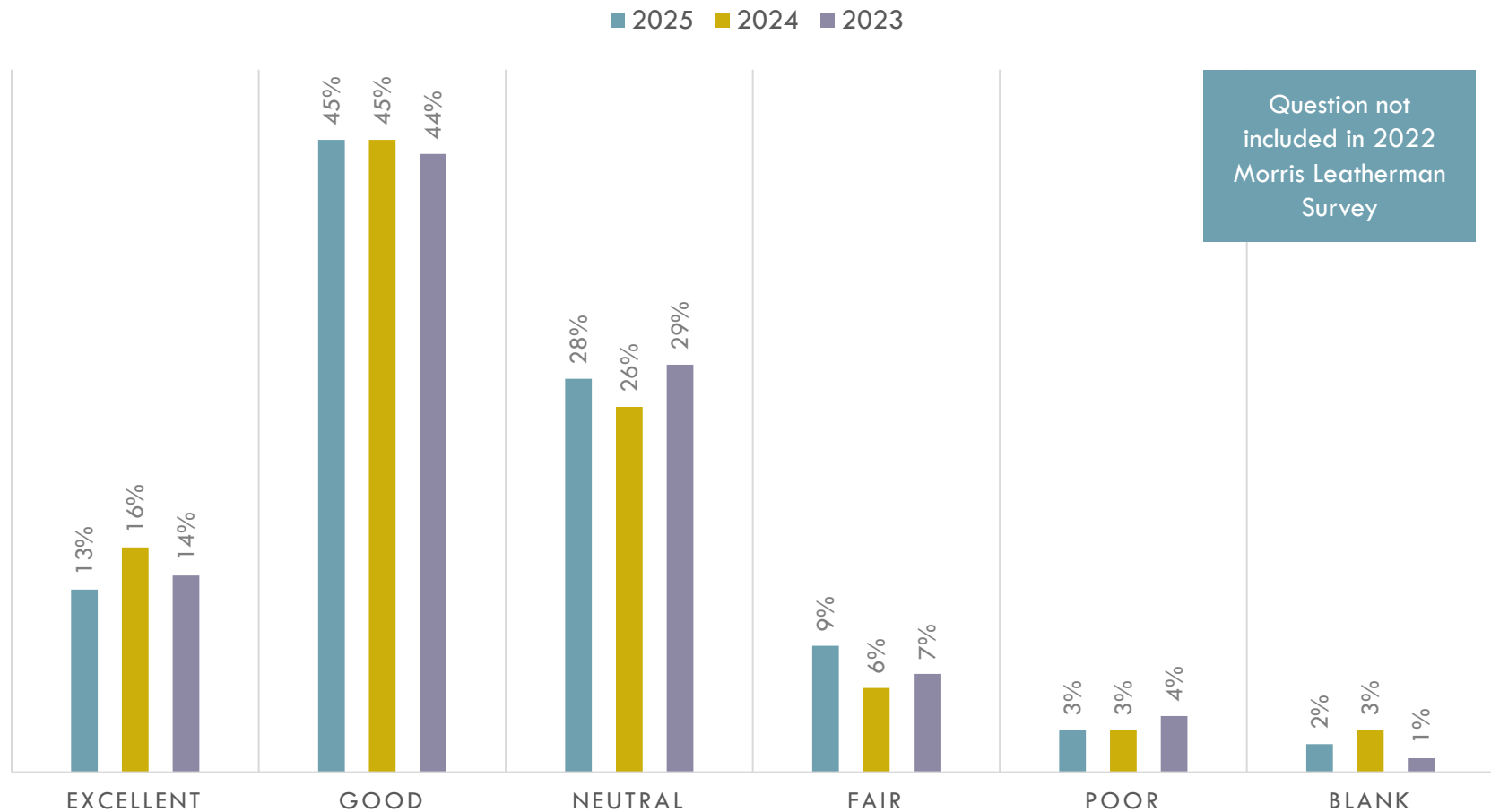

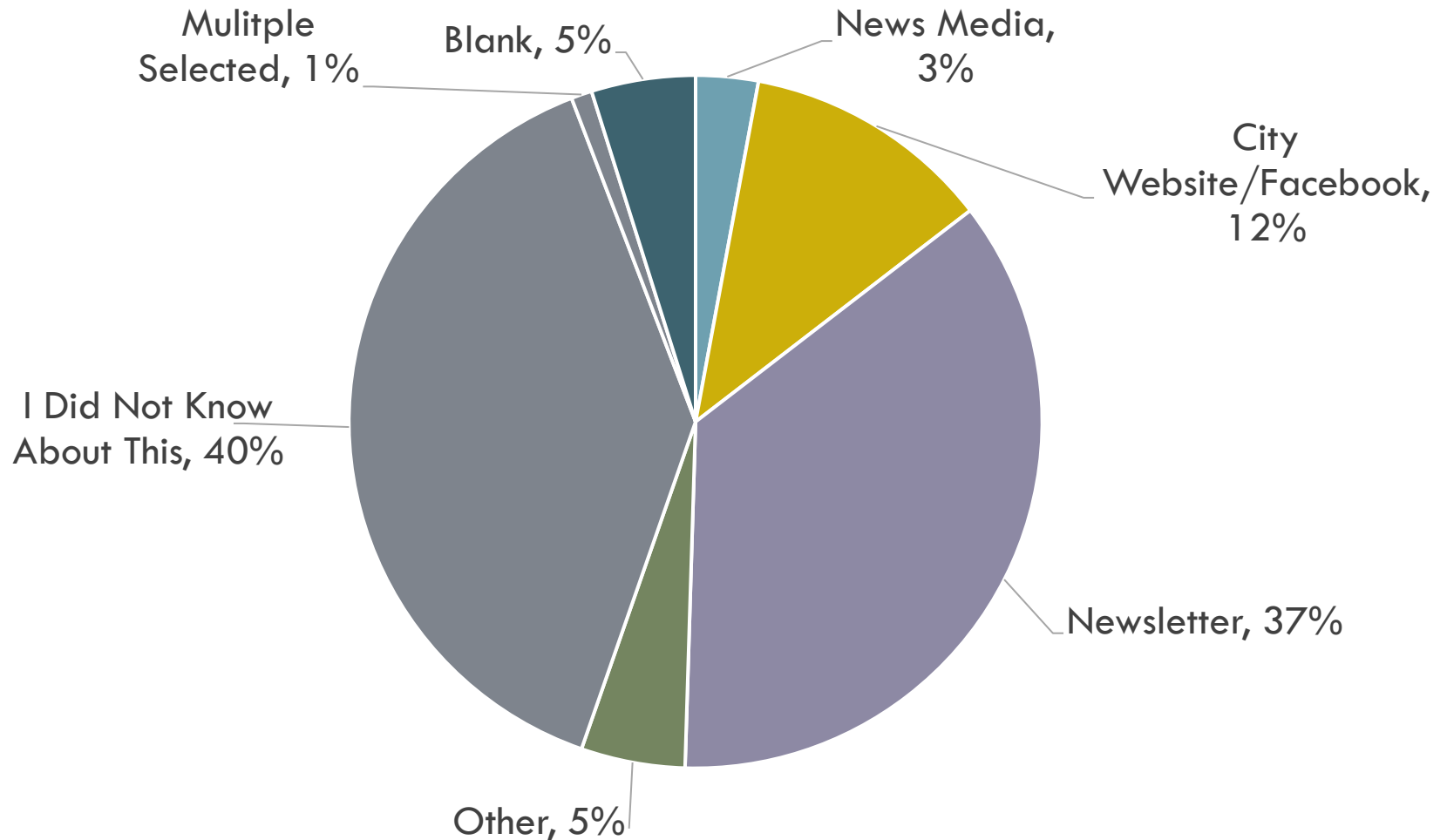

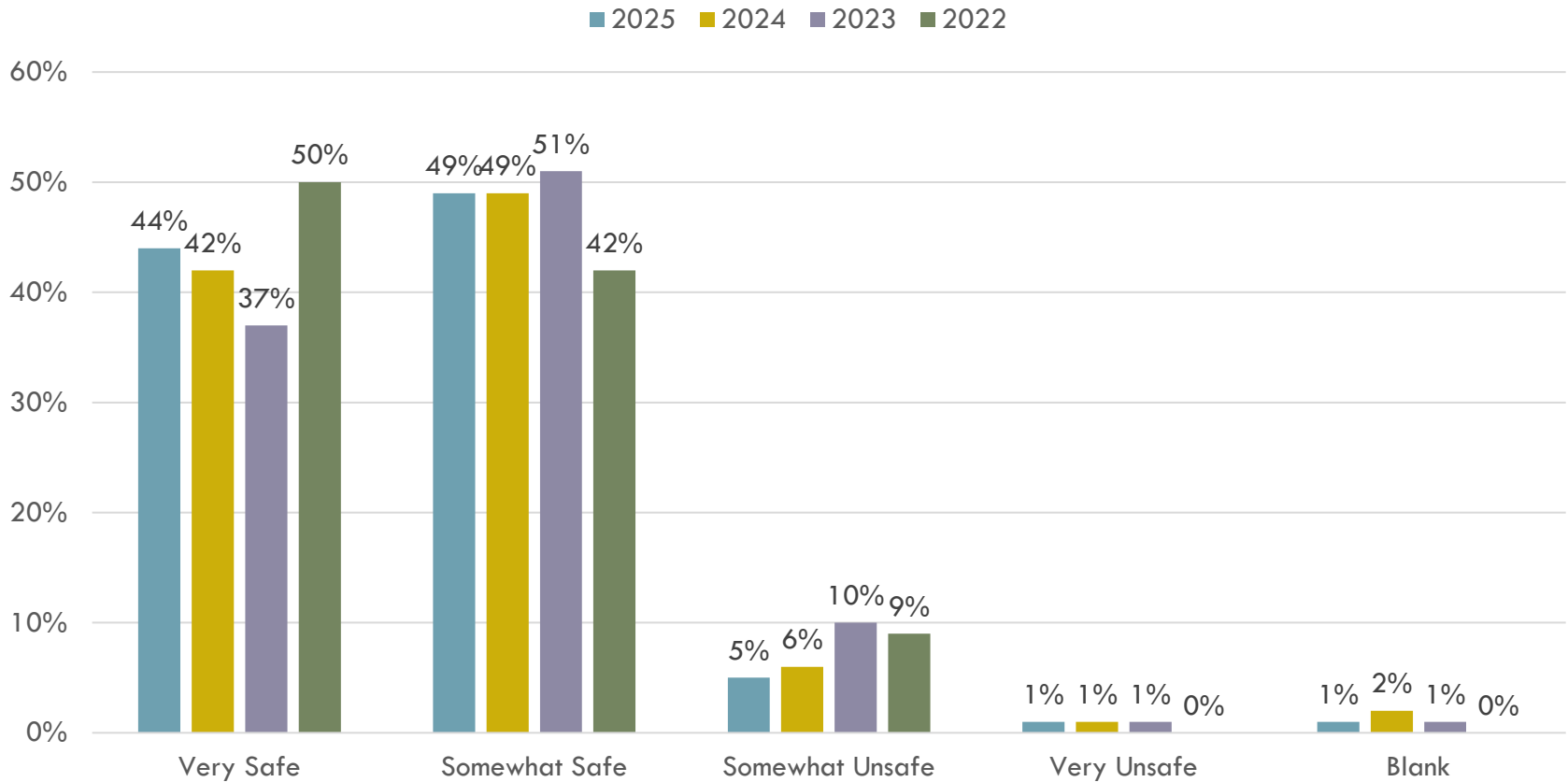

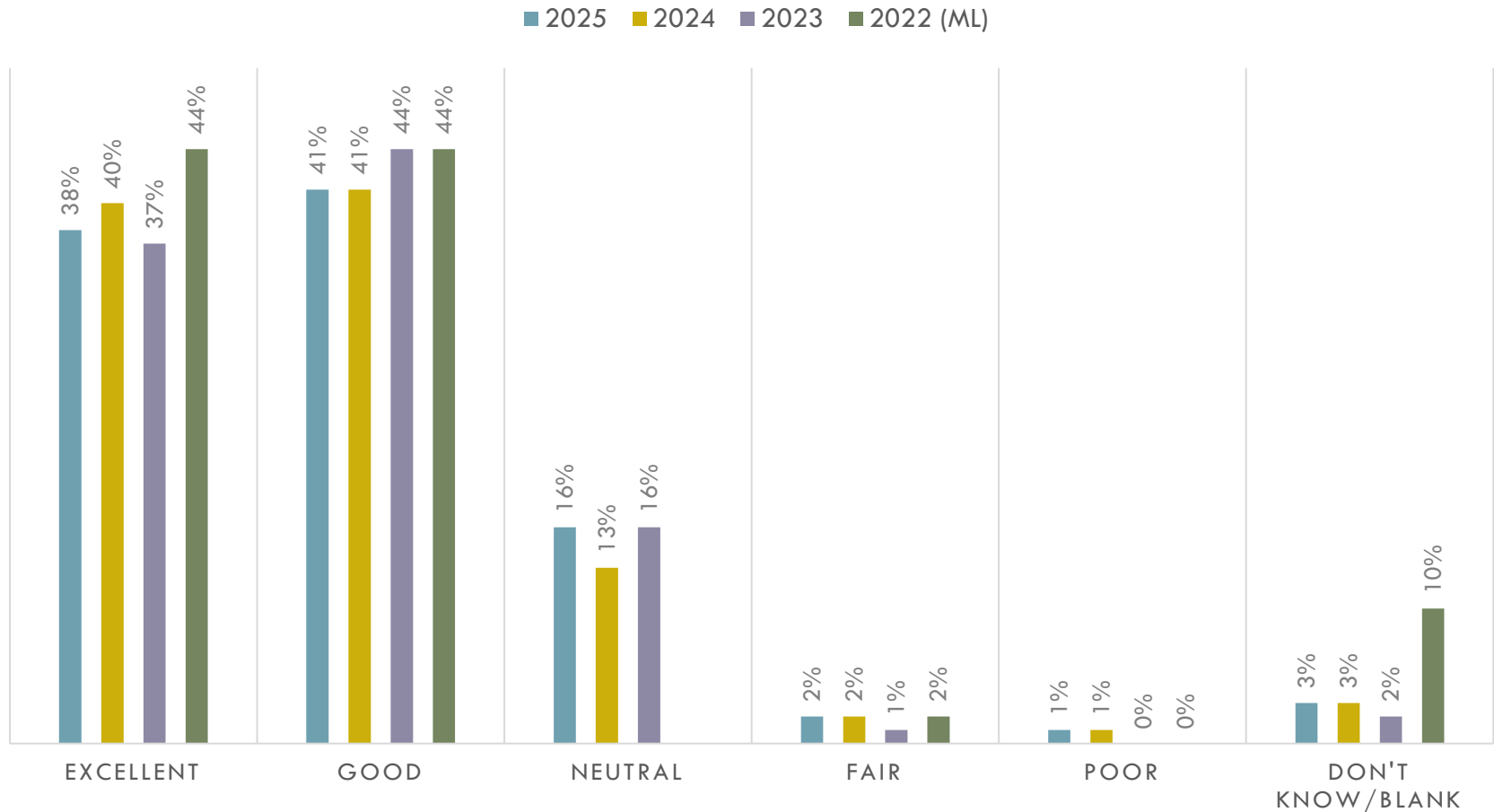

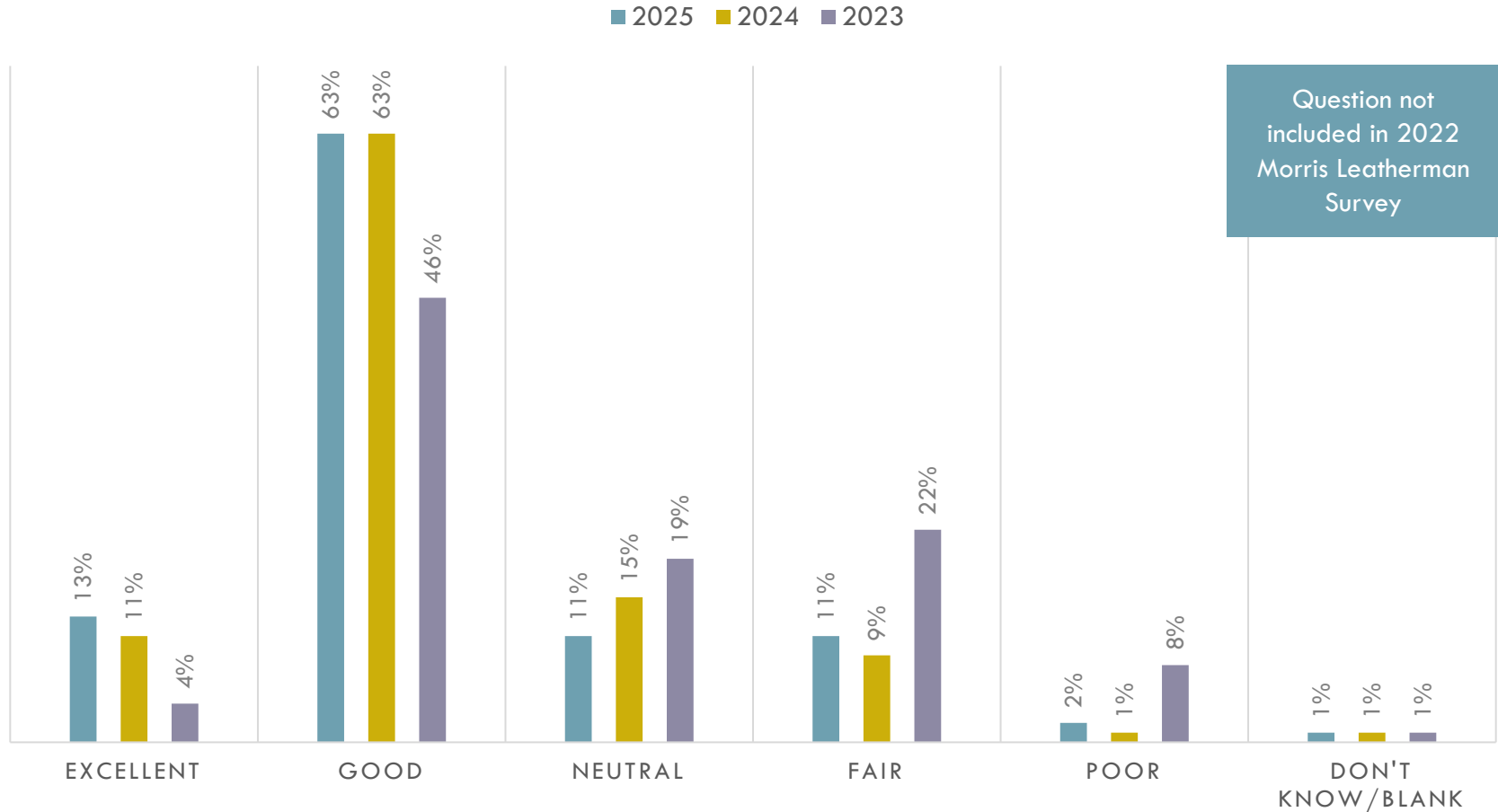

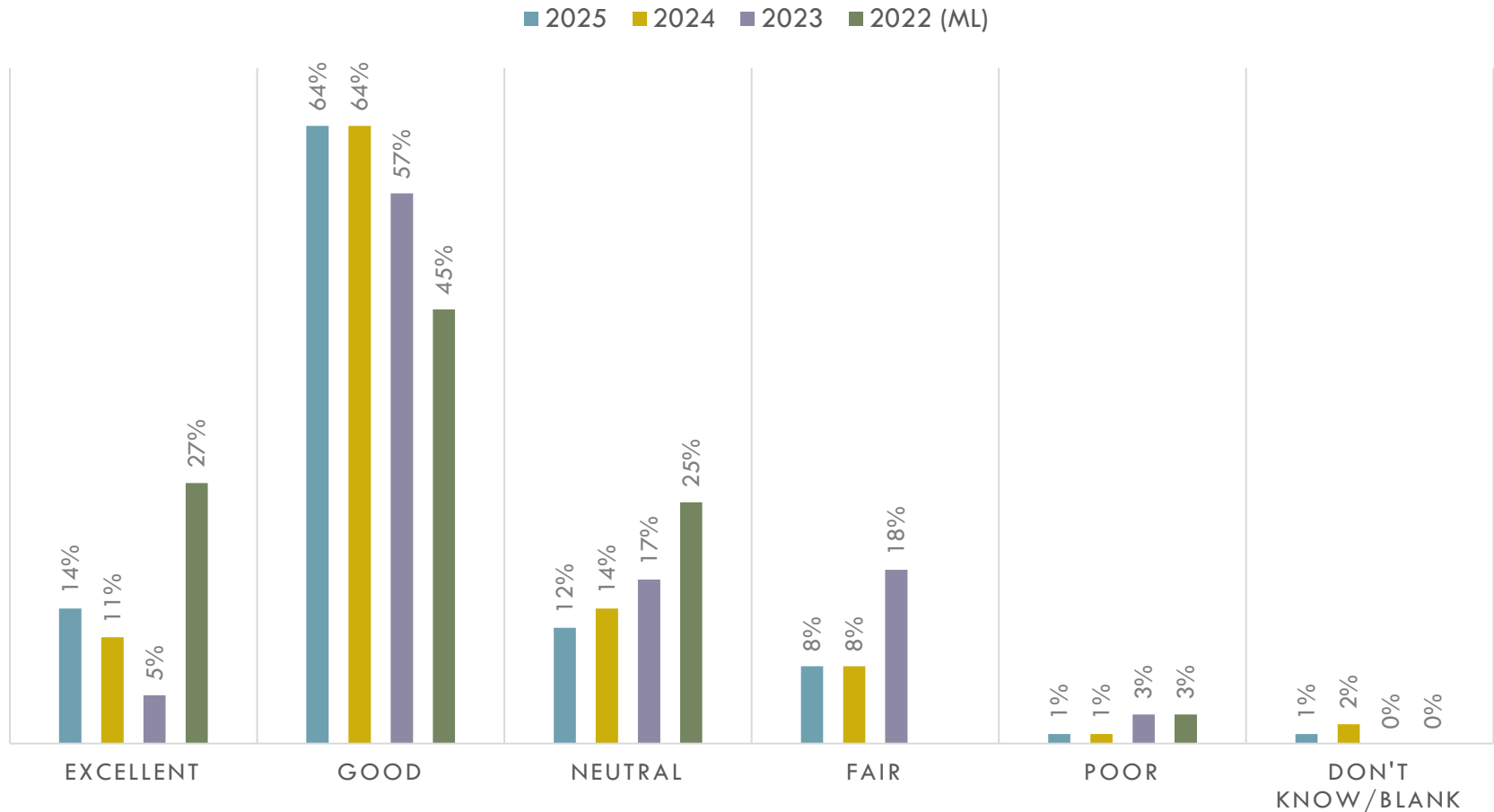

Q7: HOW WOULD YOU RATE THE OVERALL CONDITION OF COUNTY ROADS?



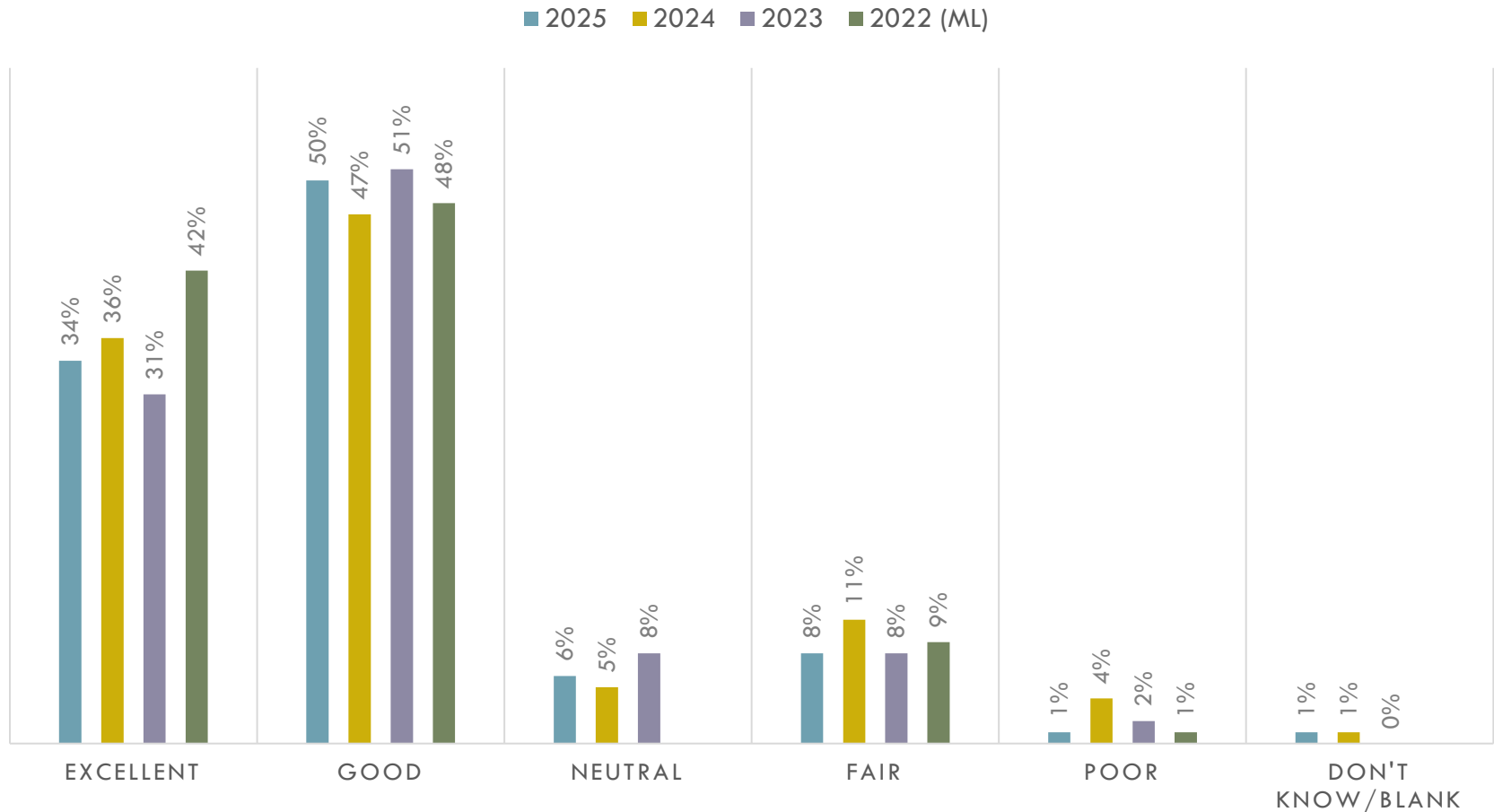

Q8: HOW WOULD YOU RATE THE OVERALL CONDITION OF CITY STREETS?



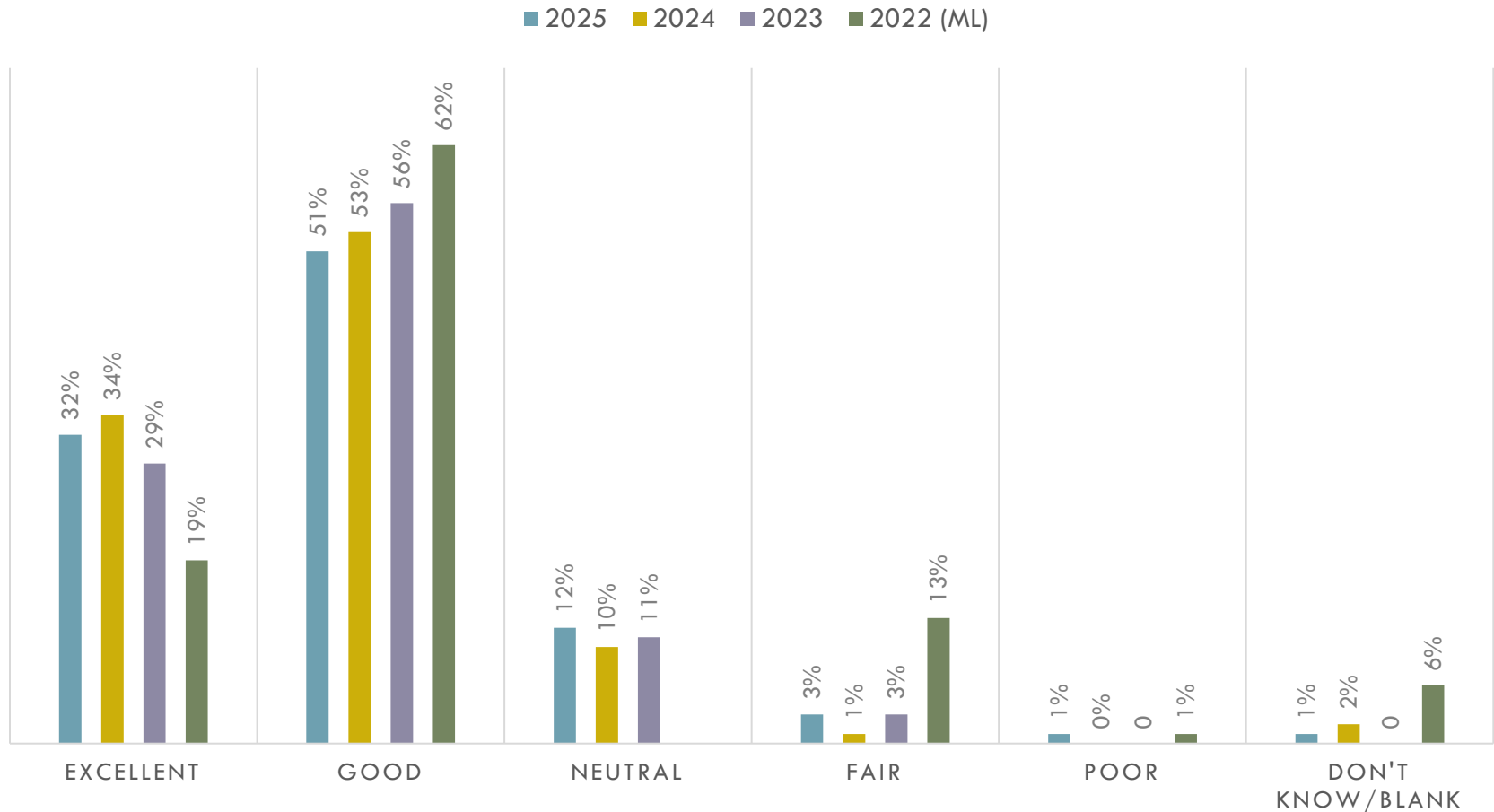

Q9: HOW WOULD YOU RATE THE OVERALL QUALITY OF SNOWPLOWING ON CITY STREETS?



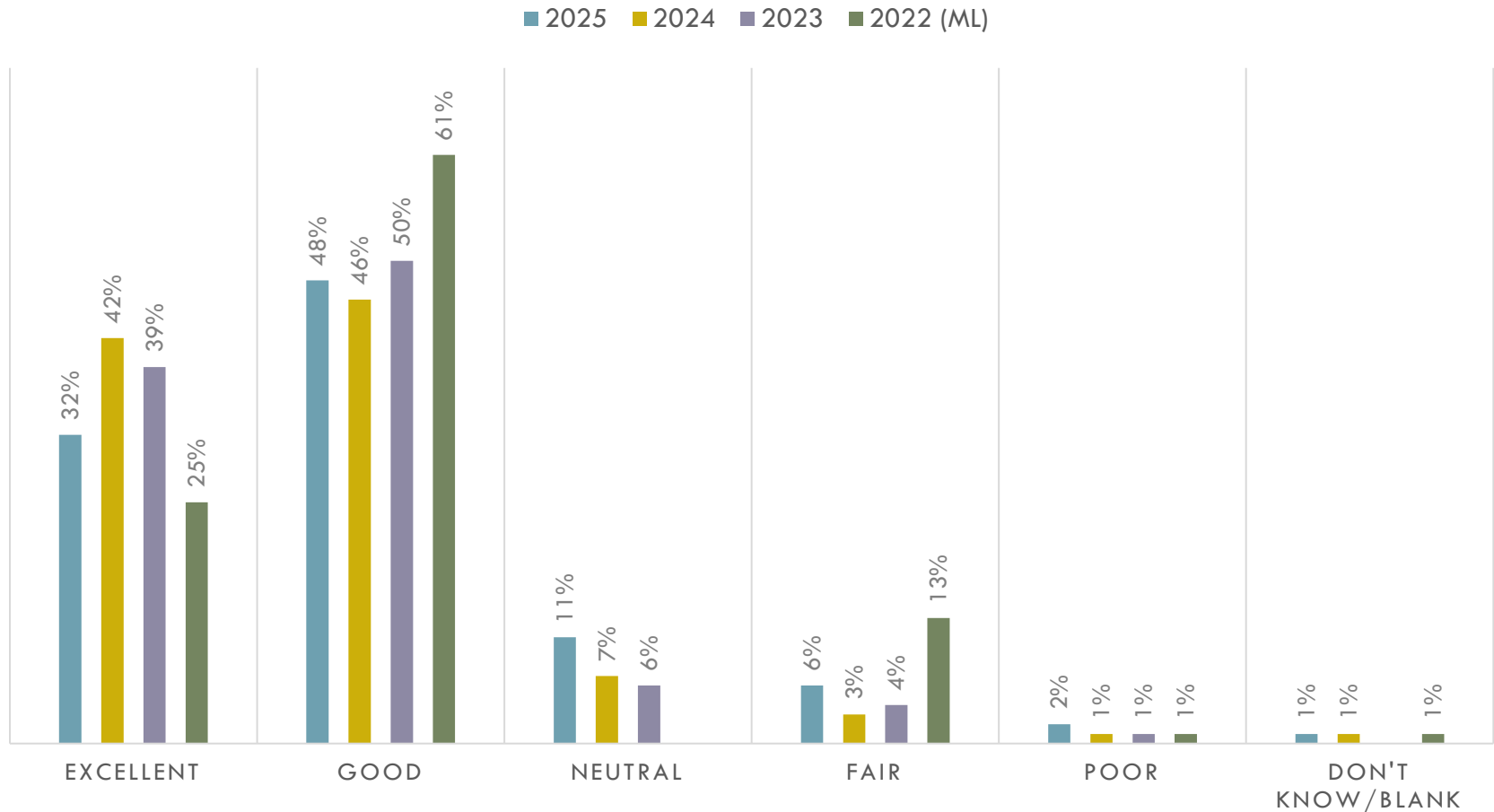

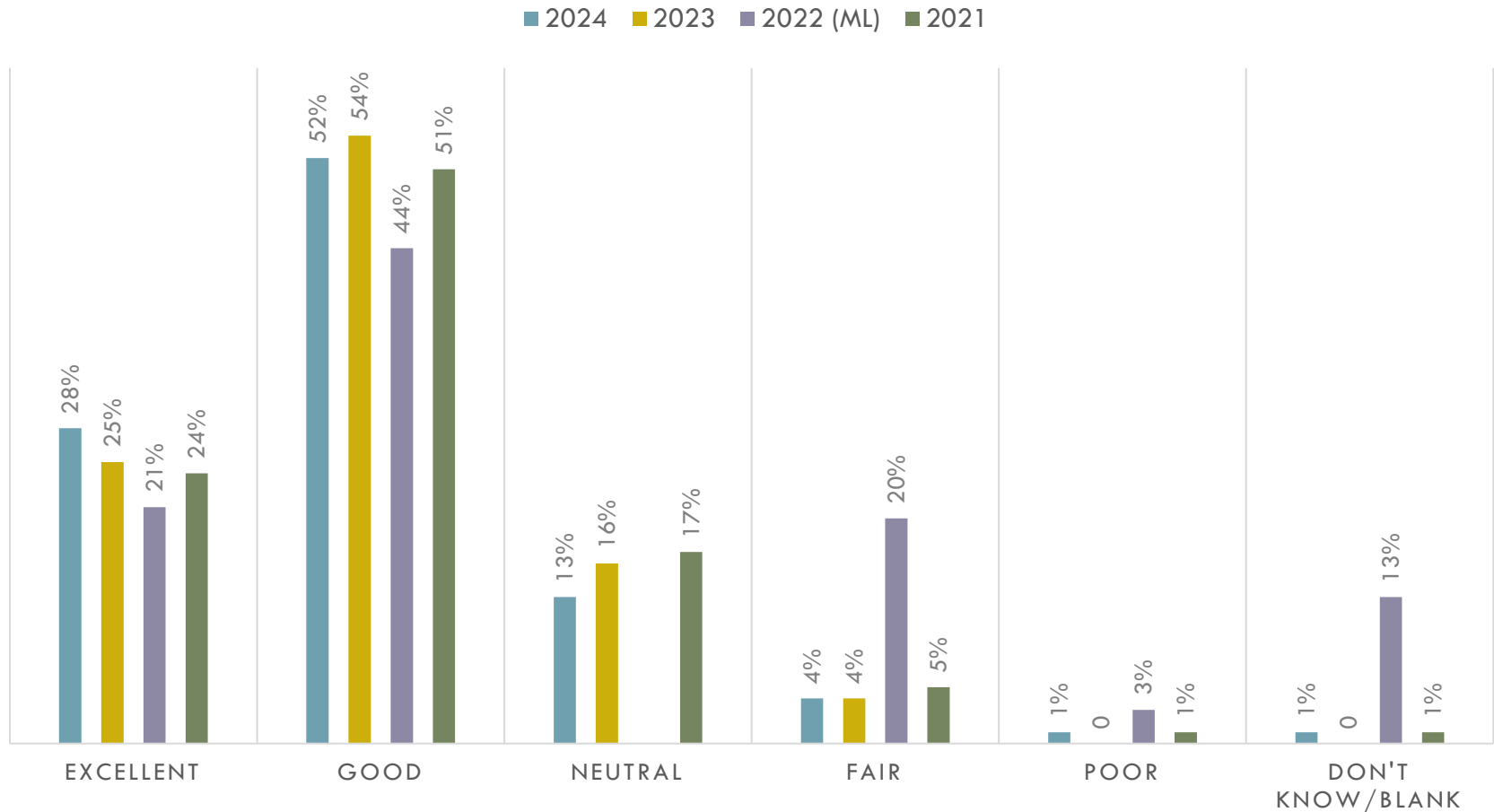

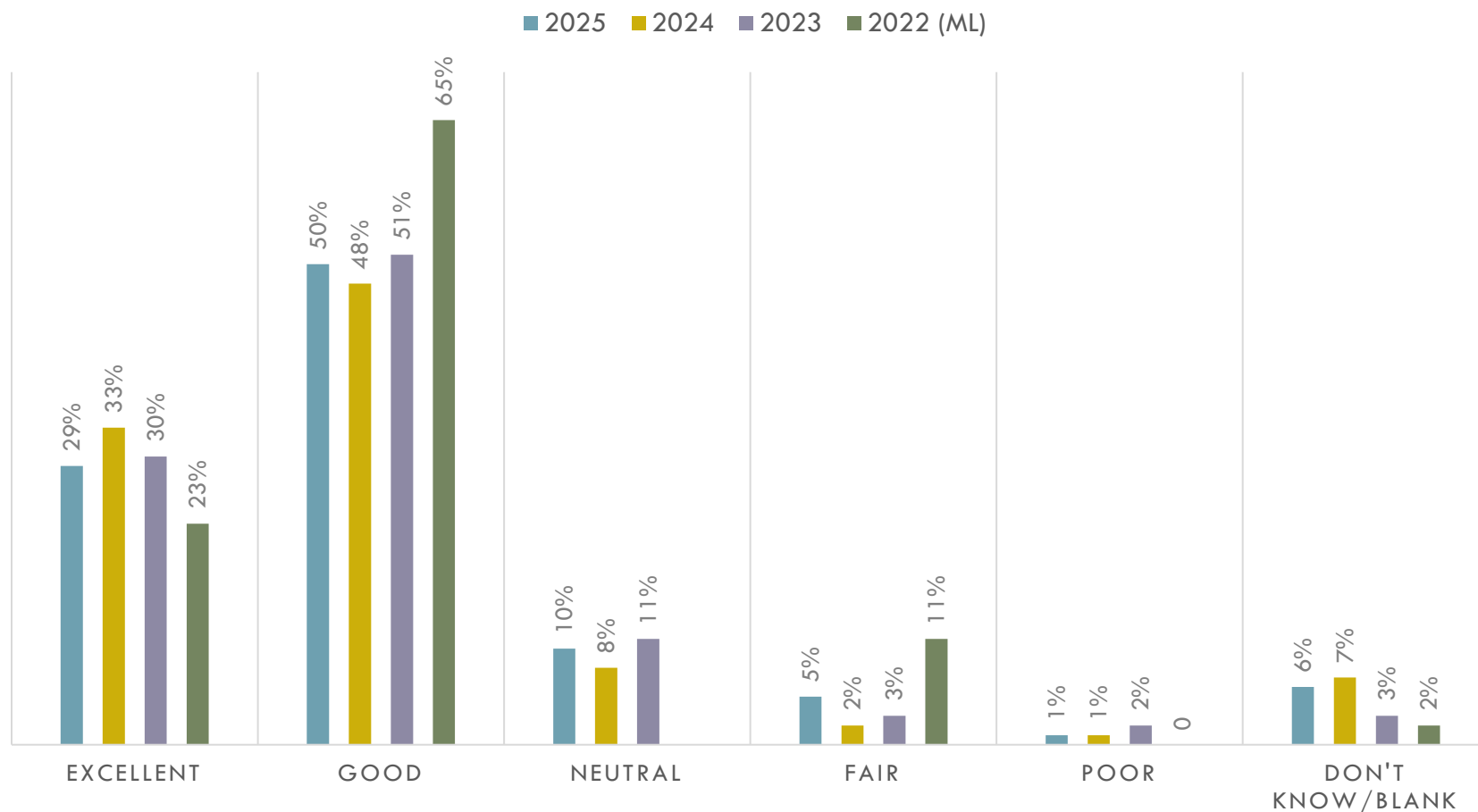

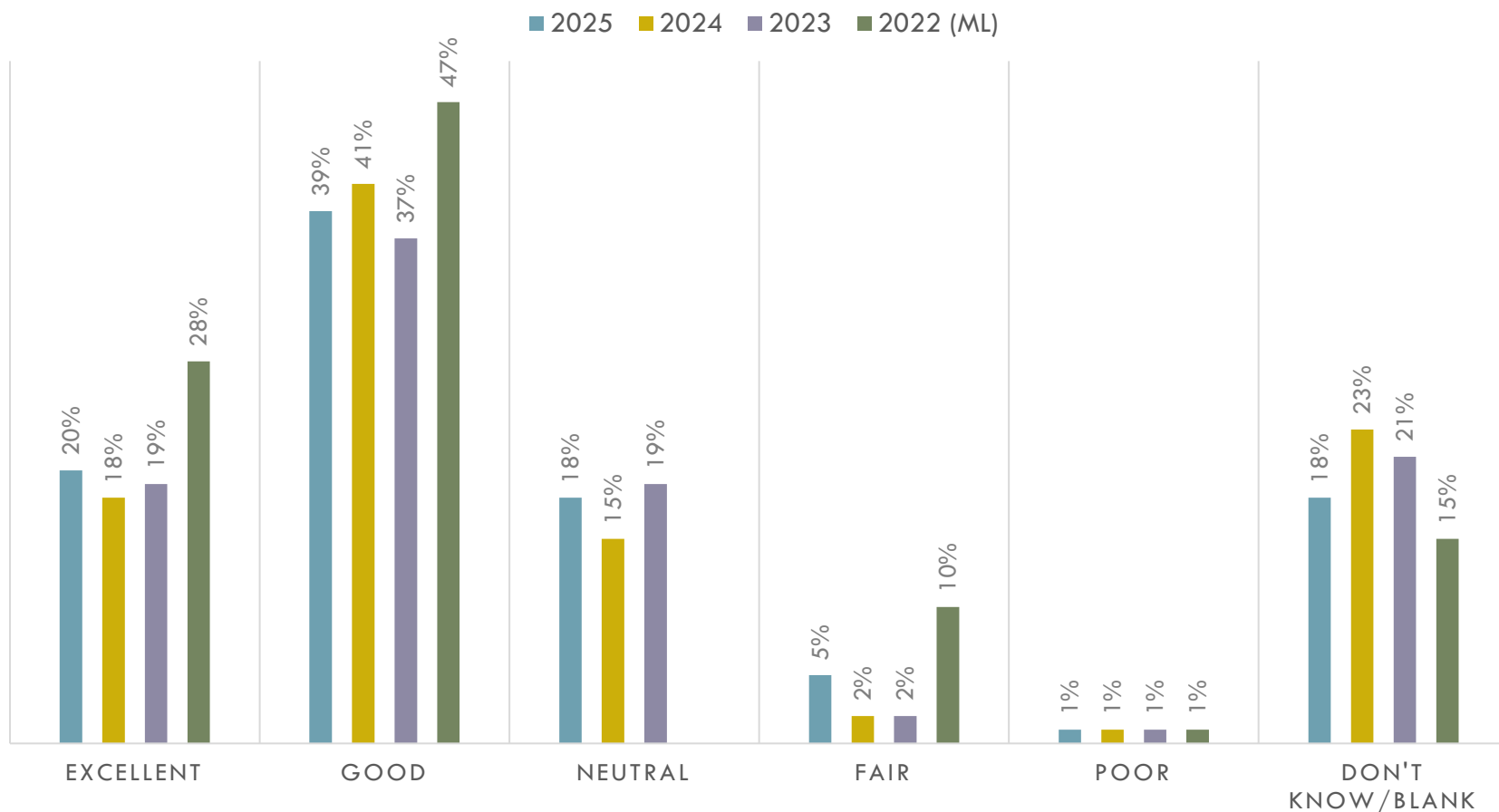

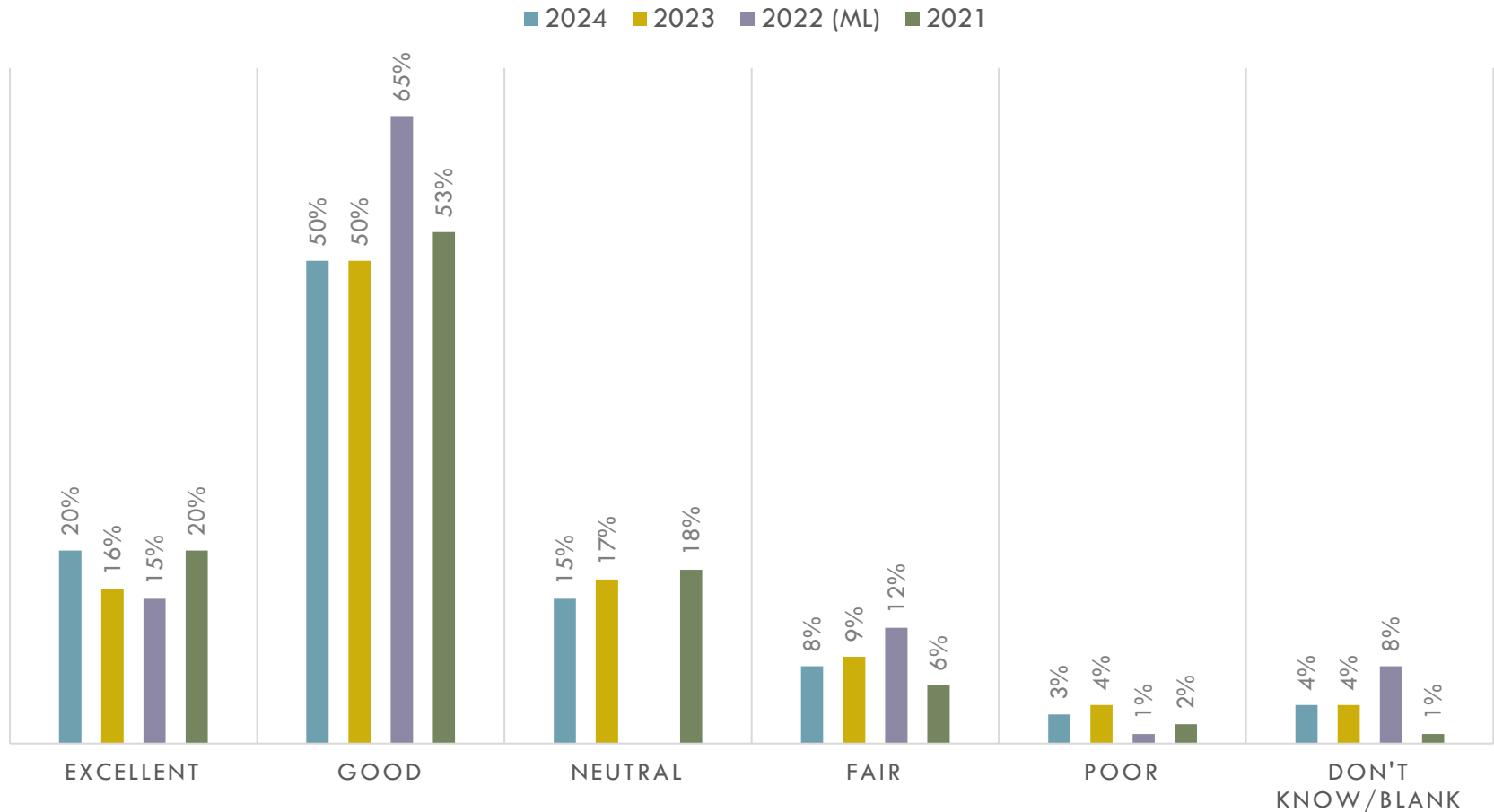

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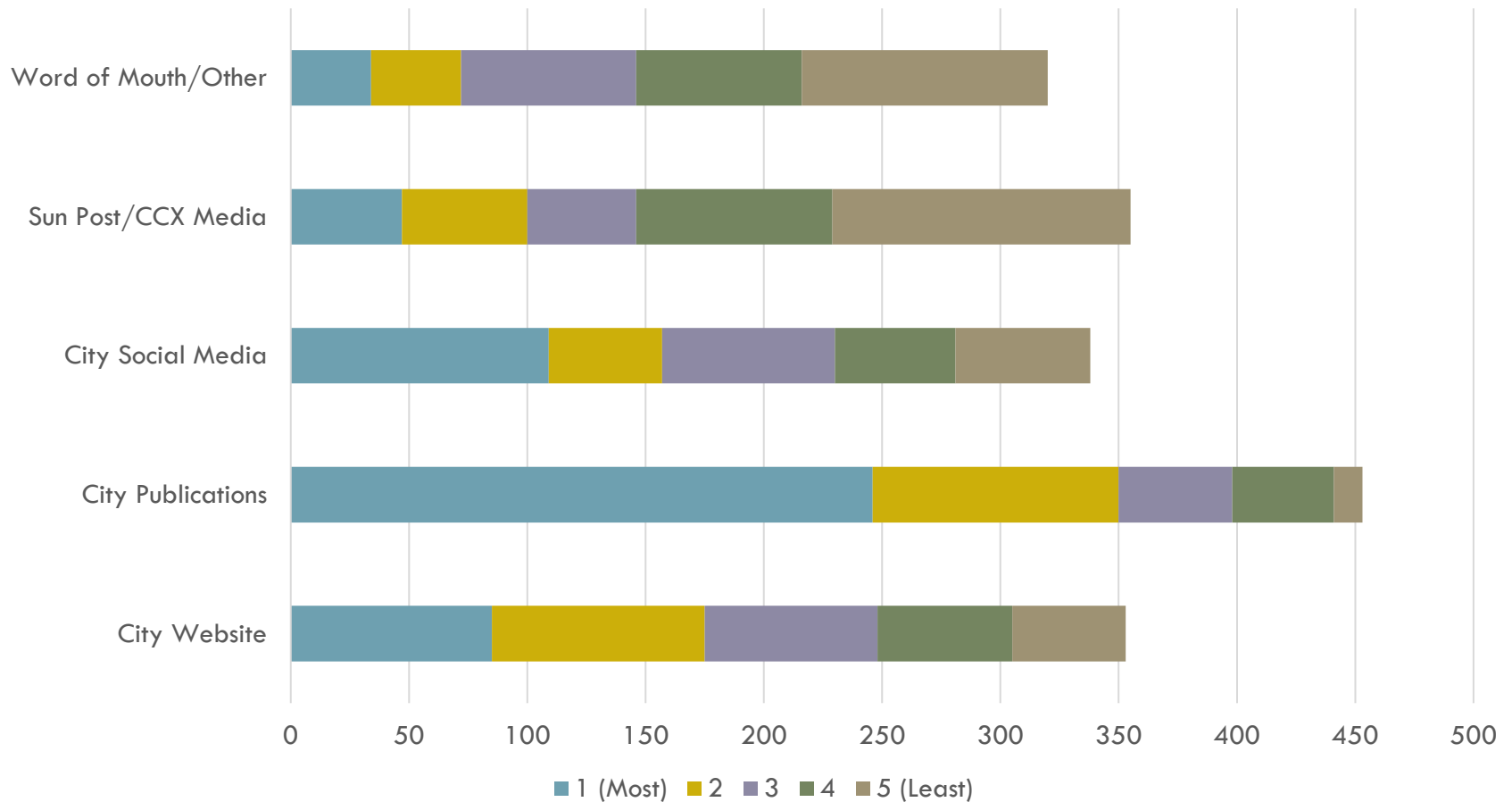

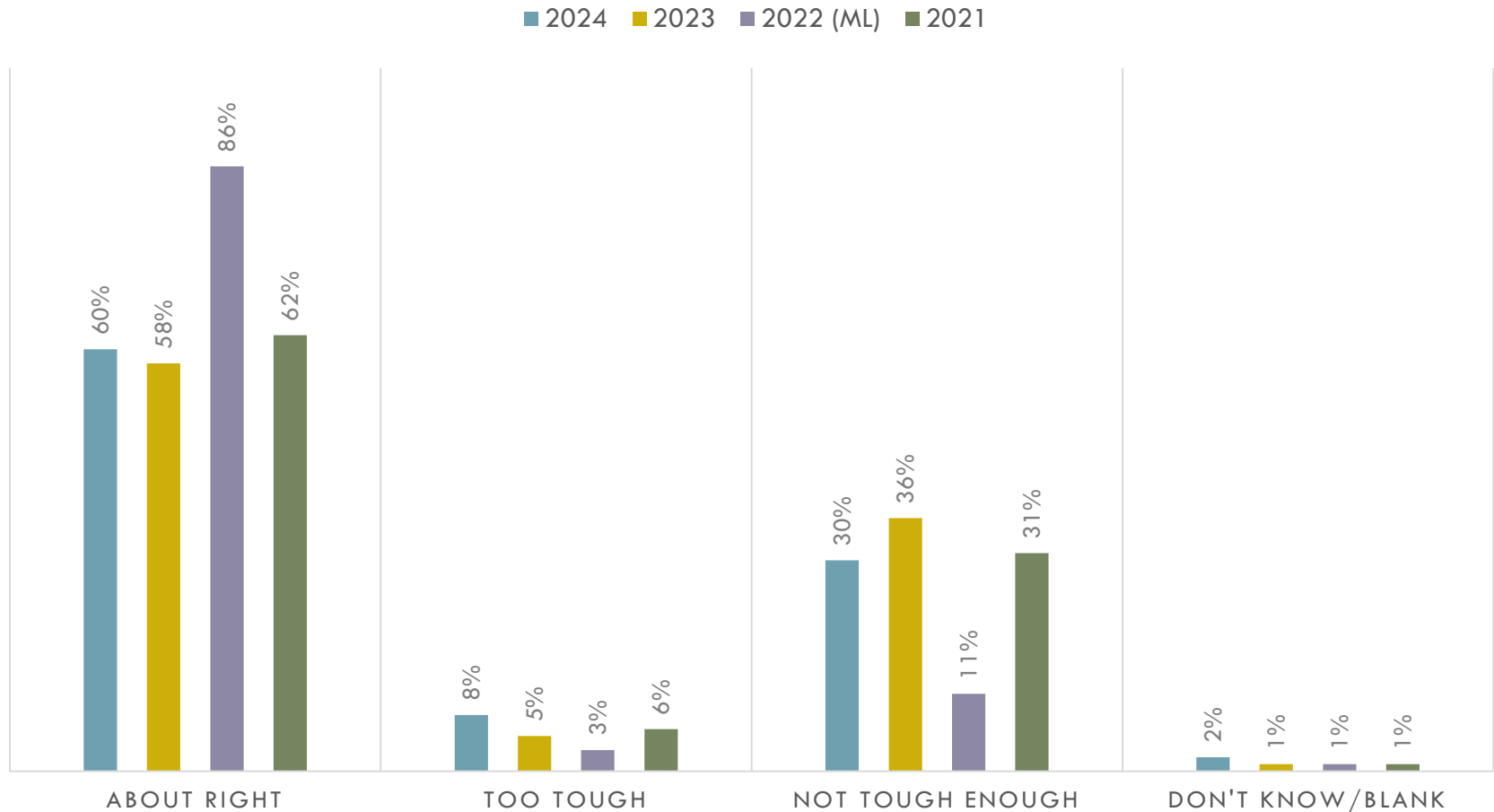
Q16: OF THESE SOURCES, RANK HOW YOU OBTAIN MOST OF YOUR INFORMATION
